South Sudan struggles to provide its citizens with even the most basic needs: Water & sanitation.



38% of the population has to walk over 30 minutes to collect drinking water

Citizens cannot take care of their families and need to leave their communities in search for water and other WASH services.



Only one in 10 has access to adequate sanitation while 60% practice open defecation



This creates large groups of domestic refugees, while women often face and engage in violence at water points.




